Letter from Cheryl Towns, BSN, RN

Chief Community Care Officer, Trenton Health Team

As the leader of Trenton Health Team's work in the community, I'm proud to serve in ways that make a real difference — to individuals, to the people who support them, and to the community as a whole. Trenton

Health Team is the glue that helps everyone work for a healthy Trenton.

My team works with people who are like themselves, people who are caught in the middle, people who work every day, who don't have money or time to address important issues, like making doctor's appointments, refilling medications, understanding rights for kids in school, or taking steps to improve their earning power.

Say you have hypertension and you're not taking your medication because the doctor won't refill it until you get blood work done and a new appointment. You can't get that appointment for another few months. You end up going to the ER with a complication.

Or, imagine you couldn't take your child to get the needed immunizations so they can no longer go to school, now you can't go to work because you have to find someone to watch your kids.

We help individuals take steps to improve their situation. And Trenton Health Team helps anyone, no matter their circumstance.



Trenton is a vibrant, complex working city where many people are working multiple jobs, caring for relatives, relying on shared transportation, negotiating with landlords and raising their families. More than 30% of the community speaks a language other than English at home and the median income is



45% of the New Jersey average. In this context, making choices that maximize health and well-being and accessing clinical care can present residents with overwhelming challenges. Support systems don't always work as they should.

Trenton's residents face obstacles in accessing essential services. Area hospitals and clinics are overburdened, and disease rates run high. However, Trenton remains resilient, and Trenton Health Team, banding together with community partners, creates practical, data-backed solutions to help close Trenton's health gap.

Bridging Community and Systems: Trenton Health Team's Role



In Trenton's complex environment, there is an acute need for direct support for individuals to access the services they need, as well as a need for data-driven insight to identify where and why systems fail, and how systems can be changed to improve health and well being. Trenton Health Team fills these needs, creating a bridge between community members' lived experience and the policies and practices created by larger entities that provide services.



Trenton Health Team works in three interdependent ways:

- 1 THT employs, supports and deploys people with lived experience in the Trenton community to work with individuals and community groups, assessing health care needs and helping residents learn how to care for and advocate for themselves.
- 2 THT lends capacity to the web of organizations working on community health, through its work as a convenor, program manager, lead applicant for funding, and fiscal sponsor.
- 3 THT harnesses community experience combined with rigorous data analysis to help our partners to pinpoint gaps and barriers to service, and identify ways to improve service delivery and health systems.

Making an Impact on Health Outcomes in Trenton

Our work focuses on creating meaningful changes to community health indicators. We work with local partners to identify the most pressing areas where changes are needed, then gather momentum around that issue, using data to confirm what works.

THT coordinates 30+ organizations working to publish a Food Security Map that provides hyperlocal guidance on the root causes of food insecurity. This brings more food to areas of greatest need and helps donated dollars go further.

About 13% of adults in Trenton have diabetes, and half of these are not receiving medical care.



Early detection and preventive care are critical tools to reduce chronic disease such as diabetes and cancer.

Our Community Care Team educates and supports individuals in taking diagnostic and preventive steps to improve their own health.

40% of Trenton residents rely on Medicaid for health services.

THT's Community Care team reaches out to potentially eligible residents and NJ FamilyCare Medicaid members. We help them enroll or re-enroll in coverage, using multiple languages.

6.1% of Trenton children under 6 have elevated blood lead levels, compared to 1.9% statewide.



Our Community Care team connects young families to home assessments and prevents lead poisoning before it happens.

Trenton Health Team has been serving Trenton since 2006, a unique response to a healthcare crisis spurred by the closure of Mercer Medical Center, and the product of the collaboration of competing partners and the city government. What began as an unlikely partnership among competitors has grown into a small but mighty organization consisting of about 40 staff members who are deeply rooted in the community we call home. We respond to the ever-changing and complex needs of Trenton by building unique partnerships, piloting new projects and ideas, and creating novel tools that help us and our partners improve health outcomes. In a city that is too often overlooked, we're proud to be the neighbor you can count on to build trusted relationships and a healthier, more just Trenton.

After nearly 20 years, we have grown to a team of around 40, learned how to work effectively in our community, and become a trusted partner to local organizations and state agencies. Today, Trenton Health Team is a fully independent non-profit with staff and leadership that reflects the community we serve.

Building Community Partnerships to Increase Impact

Trenton. THT plays the role of convenor in bringing together groups to work on common interests such as food security, community development, maternal health, substance use, and community care.

Using Data to Inform Policy And Change



During the pandemic, many Trenton residents could not access food they needed for their families. THT responded by publishing a 'Free Food Finder' with information on locations,

times and what's on offer. This tool inspired the creation of a Food Insecurity Index that maps where the most intense areas of need for food access are, providing hyperlocal information for agencies on where to target their services. The Index was created in partnership with the Mercer County Food Stakeholders, the NJ Office of the Food Security Advocate, and many local providers. "THT has been a key partner to CJFHC.
